Dear Families of Tarneit Rise Primary School,

Goodbye to Week Six and Welcome to Week Seven! Wow, how this term is flying!

### A Safe and Healthy Lunchbox

This week we have welcomed warmer weather and sunshine. Now the warmer weather is upon us, it is even more important to follow food safety rules to ensure the food in children's lunch box remains fresh and safe for consumption during the school day. Firstly, consider a lunch box with built-in insulation or freezer packs. Secondly, arrange perishable foods such as chicken or egg in between cold items; this could be in between freezer packs or water. And thirdly, once children arrive home, it is important to dispose of any perishable lunch box leftovers as by this time, freezer packs will have melted, and perishable foods may have developed bacteria which can lead to food poisoning.

A healthy lunchbox is important to children's alertness and focus during the school day, so it is VERY important to fuel children with healthy foods. Did you know the food in children's lunchbox can make up a third of children's daily food intake, providing the energy they need to get through the busy school day? So, a lunchbox filled with sugary and fatty foods does not provide the required energy or necessary vitamins and minerals for children to retain information and learn. In children's lunchbox, consider popping in the following foods: fresh fruit, crunchy vegetables, protein foods such as lean meat or hardboiled eggs, cheese sticks or grated cheese, yogurt, sliced bread, a roll, pita bread, flat bread, plain popcorn, crackers and of course water.

Consider making the following swaps to children's lunchboxes:

- -sweetened yogurt for low sugar yogurt or plain, natural yogurt
- -cake bars and muesli bars for sugar- free jelly
- -muffins and chocolate for fruit bread
- -chips for fresh or tinned fruit (not in syrup but in juice) or chopped vegetables and hummus
- -juice pouches for plain popcorn or rice cakes

#### Tarneit Rise Primary School Uniform

As of late, we have noticed an increase in the number of children wearing non- school uniform items. We are very proud of our Tarneit Rise Primary School uniform. Our school uniform fosters a sense of community and belonging and encourages our children to develop pride in their appearance. It supports the school's commitment to ensuring our children feel equal and are dressed safely and appropriately for school activities. Furthermore, it reduces student competition based on clothing and enhances the profile and identity of the school and its children within the wider community. Given this, it is critical children wear only school uniform items when at school. If your child is in incorrect uniform, your child will receive a uniform infringement notice to bring home. If you require support for uniform, please contact the school and ask to speak to the business manager. 
# School Hats, Beanies & Scarves

If your child is unwell or won't be attending on the days your child is required to be at school during this term, an explanation must be provided to the school. There are a few options for providing this information:




# Instructions to log your child's absence on Compass

Step 1: Click on more at bottom right hand corner






Step 2: Click on open in browser



Dear Prep Families and Carers,

We have reached the halfway point of Term 4 which is a very exciting time of the year. All teachers have been amazed at the continued growth of all students and all that they have achieved in the first half of Term 4. We are very excited to see what everyone will achieve in the last half of the term as we get closer to being ready for Grade 1.

Let's look at what we've been learning over the past couple of weeks:

#### Reading

During Reading, students have been continuing to explore different literacy skills utilised in order to further our understanding of a text. The first skill we have been focusing on is making a prediction about our text using text clues. The second skill we have been focusing on is visualising. Students have been tuning into their 5 senses and imagination to describe and draw what they visualise from a listening to a passage read aloud. The third skill that we have been exploring is making a text-to-self connection. We have been discussing the events and character emotions that we've seen in our texts and reflecting upon these aspects to make a connection. Students have been discussing what the text reminds them of, a time that they felt similar or even something similar that happened to them.

The preps have been continuing to expand their reading and spelling skills by learning about sounds ai and ay. We have been learning about these sounds through both Phonics Reading and Writing.

#### Writing

Our Prep students are continuing to develop their writing skills by learning through our narrative unit. Students continue to be explicitly taught how to write their very own narrative. We are still having a dedicated focus on how to construct a beginning, middle and end to a story. The preps have loved exploring this unit and getting to be an author of their very own story!



#### Maths

In Maths, we have been learning about money. We have been exploring how we use money in everyday life and how to distinguish Australian currency from foreign currencies. We have also been developing our knowledge around the value of money and how goods and services all cost a certain amount of money.

#### Swimming:

Our swimming program is well and truly underway with classes having finished with their program and other classes yet to start. We have had such a successful start to the program and the students have had an absolute blast. In the classroom we have been learning about how to stay safe near water at the pool and beach. For students yet to go, please ensure you are talking to your children about the swimming pool and what they are going to do there. 
Please also ensure that you are developing your child's independence by getting them to dress and undress themselves for school. This will get them ready to be doing it themselves at the pool.

Dear Grade 1 Families and Carers,

Welcome to Week 6! How are we already halfway through term 4?

#### Reading

Over the past few weeks, we have been learning to identify the Author's purpose for writing a text. We have used the PIE acronym to help the students to remember the different purposes. P is for persuade, I is for inform and E is for entertain. The students have enjoyed sorting through their books to find the different purposes.



#### Writing

Synthetic Phonics focus: revision and contractions n't and 'II.

The new heart words we have learnt are **though**, **son**, **daughter** and **whose**. You may like to ask your child to place our new heart words in a sentence.

Our grade ones have completed the unit on procedures. We have moved on to poetry! The first poem we looked at was an Acrostic Poem. The students wrote their names down on their pages before writing adjectives that describe them. We are looking forward to seeing the creations our poets make!



#### Mathematics

In Mathematics, our students have been learning to tell the time to **o'clock** and **half past**. Students have enjoyed creating their own clocks which they have used in their lessons. You can support your child at home with this unit by asking the following questions:

What number is the minute hand on? What number is the hour hand on?





### Vocabulary

In Vocabulary, we are learning tier 2 words from our serial text 'Matilda' written by Roald Dahl. Our vocabulary words from last week were **horrid**, **brilliant**, **harmless** and **puzzled**. Our new words for this week are **furious**, **whimpering**, **inspecting** and **peeved**.



# Reading

#### Writing

In Writing, the children are continuing to develop their persuasive writing skills, which is critically important in many aspects of their education. Perhaps you would like to have your child use their persuasive skills to convince you to let them have a special treat!

#### Numeracy

In Numeracy, we are learning all about money. Counting and ordering coins is the foundation for building financial literacy.



You might like to consider making your next purchase a cash transaction so your child can help you count the money required or check that you received the right amount of change. Exposing your child to cash will help broaden their understanding of our money system beyond the replicas we use in class.

# Vocabulary

In Vocabulary, students are continuing to learn some amazing new language. Last week our focus words were stumble, pity, obvious, dissolve and depart. This week our focus words are feast, mend, bewilder, bitterly, clumsy. These words are taken from our very exciting serial text 'Rowan of Rin'. It has been wonderful to read this fantasy genre and the excitement of our hero Rowan, developing his bravery and courage to save his village.



Dear Grade 3 families,

Well we blinked and we are now in the middle of term 4. We have had an amazing start to the term and the students are getting excited about moving into grade four.

#### Reading

In reading, we have been learning about action verbs, thinking verbs, saying verbs, sensing verbs and relating verbs. Verbs are doing words and describe how characters are moving, feeling, talking or thinking in a text. Students are learning these types of verbs to support them with their comprehension and inferencing skills. Over the next couple of weeks, the students will be able to demonstrate their understanding when completing class assessments. Students are also working on increasing their fluency by working in groups or pairs when reading aloud which will allow them to practice their pace, their use of expression and their intonation.

#### Writing

In writing, we are now moving into writing explanation texts. These texts are different from a procedural text or an information report as they go into detail using 'how and 'why' questions. The students will learn about and write about 'how birds fly' and 'how planes fly'. The students will use their familiar Single Paragraph Outline (SPOs) to scaffold their writing and plan their paragraphs before drafting and publishing their final

#### Numeracy

For numeracy, the students had a lot of fun in developing chance experiments and exploring the concept that some things are beyond their control, or are random, such as rolling dice, pulling out cards or tossing coins. Using the language of certain, likely, unlikely, impossible and equal chance. We are now moving into our unit on Money, where we will learn about different ways of making dollar amounts, exploring the concept of 'how many ways can you make \$1' and will then learn about capacity.



# Vocabulary

In Vocabulary, we have learnt 5 new words from our serial text 'Paper Planes'. We have learnt the words glimpse, confident, flamboyant, launch and intrigue. The students have participated in vocabulary activities to build on their knowledge of these words such as 'word illustrations', where students develop an image that helps their understanding of the words. The 'finish the sentence' activity makes sure that they understand the vocabulary word in the correct context. Students track their understanding of the vocabulary words through a self-assessment three times a week. Once in the beginning, middle and end of the week. This is a way of allowing the students to see their growth in vocabulary.


#### Reminders:

- If students wish to bring in Sip and Crunch, it must be cut up fruit or vegetables in a container.
- Term 4 requires students to wear the TRPS hat as the weather starts heating up and the sun rays become stronger. If you would like your child to pack sunscreen in their bags this is okay.

#### Reading

In Reading, Grade 4s have been learning about mountains. They have explored how mountains are formed, animals that live on mountains and how mountains are barriers. These lessons encourage students to engage in rich discussion and practise their reading strategies to gain a deeper understanding of the topic. Throughout the next couple of weeks, students will learn about early African kingdoms.

### Writing

In Writing, students have continued to identify main ideas and supporting details from existing texts about their reading topic on mountains. They have been practising taking notes, turning these notes into Single Paragraph Outlines (SPO's) and turning these outlines into paragraphs for information reports. In the coming weeks, students will be moving into revising persuasive texts.

#### Numeracy

In Numeracy, students have been learning about decimals and how they are a part of our everyday lives. They have been focusing on how to use the language of decimals and how they are linked to fractions. Grade 4s will this week be focusing on ordering and rounding decimals. In the coming weeks we will be focusing on mass followed by capacity and volume.

#### Vocabulary

Grade 4s have continued to expand their reading, writing and oral language in our vocabulary lessons. Our target words for this week are *tantilise*, *anticipation*, *outrageous*, *exclamation* and *bewilder*. It has been delightful to see students using our target words in their own speech and writing.









### Writing

# Welcome, Wominjeka and Kia Ora

## I Grade Prep:

Over the last two weeks, the preps have been responding to the story, "The Mixed-Up Chameleon" by Eric Carle. Last week they created an artwork by colouring a chameleon with paint slicks and focusing on using the colours of the rainbow in order. This week they created their own mixed-up chameleon by adding different animal parts/ characteristics. They filled their chameleon with patterns and shapes, focusing once more on the colours of the rainbow.





#### Grade 1 & 2:

Last week, the grade 1s and 2s worked collaboratively to create a collage inspired by Matisse. This week, they explored Aboriginal artworks by Bronwyn Bancroft. Using her work as inspiration, they created an artwork of their family in a Boab tree. They chose either warm or cool colours to complete this painting and focused on line, shape and pattern.





### Grade 3 & 4:

The grade 3 and 4 students have been spending time experimenting with paper cutting. They looked at examples of paper cutting from around the world and discussed similarities and differences. This week they had the challenge of creating a piece that tells a story.





#### Grade 5 & 6:




Our students have been keeping really busy while learning about different topics in STEM at various grade levels.

# **TRPS Walking School Bus**


Our Walking School Bus continues even in this winter weather. We did cancel a couple of days last week due to staff illness or very bad weather.

We are trying very hard to promote active travel to school and reduce traffic congestion at TRPS.




