School Attendance

Throughout the year you will often hear us address the importance of attending school each day. Daily school attendance is important for all children to succeed in education and ensure they do not fall behind both socially and developmentally. Children who regularly attend school have better health outcomes, better employment outcomes, and higher incomes across their lives. It is important children develop the habit of attending school daily at an early age. There are no safe number of days for missing school — each day a student misses puts them behind and can affect their longer term educational and social outcomes. It is just as important for students at the beginning of their school journey to be at school each day as it is for those who are moving on to secondary school next year. EVERY day is important to ensure solid foundations for learning are built. We will continue to rigorously monitor student absences, particularly unexplained absences, which means you will receive a phone call from the school any time your child is absent for unexplained reasons and sometimes even when the absence is explained. If your child is absent, please inform us before 10 am of the reason. We will also not approve absences due to extended family holidays which occur during the term. Whilst it is more expensive, in terms of your child's development, it is only safe to go on family holidays during the school holidays.



School Uniform

When at school, it is expected all children are wearing either the complete sports uniform or the complete academic uniform (please see below). Our school uniform is important because it fosters a sense of belonging, it represents Tarneit Rise Primary School within our community, and it reduces the focus on what children wear in comparison to others. Therefore, uniform infringement notices will be issued to children who come to school wearing non-uniform items of clothing or who are wearing a combination of items from the sports uniform and the academic uniform. Regarding our school uniform and children's personal presentation, it is essential:

- children only wear the complete sports uniform or the complete academic uniform
- children are in full school uniform every day, unless there is a casual dress day
- all uniform items are clean in appearance
- garments are kept in good repair
- children wear their uniform neatly
- all uniform items are clearly named. We recommend student labels be ironed or sewn on to each uniform item rather than written. Student name labels should also be on the inside of garments only
- nail polish or false nails (acrylic, shellac, SNS, gel) are not worn
- only small, plain, and round gold or silver stud or sleeper earrings are worn in earlobes
- if children's hair reaches their collar, it is secured off the face using black, teal or hair colour clips, clasps, hair bands and hair ties only
- cultural headdress is to be either white, black, or teal only
- the only hat that is worn is the Tarneit Rise Primary School hat

Riding to School

We have many children here at Tarneit Rise Primary School who ride their bike to school. Given this, it is important our community understand bike laws in Victoria. Of particular importance are the following:

- when you are riding a bike, you and any passengers must wear a properly fitting and fastened helmet unless you are riding on private property. Your helmet must meet Australian safety standard AS/NZS2063
- A person can also be exempt from wearing a helmet for religious reasons if religious headdress makes wearing a helmet impractical. An exemption certificate is not required in these circumstances. Visit the <u>VicRoads website</u> for more information about exemptions from wearing a helmet.
- riders must ride at a safe speed, especially around pedestrians on shared paths and footpaths and slower bike riders
- children 12 years old or under and 13 years or over and riding with a child who is 12 years old or under permitted to ride on a footpath
- when riding on a footpath, riders must keep to the left and give way to pedestrians
 children can ride on the road, but it may be safer for them to ride on the footpath. Children 12 years or under can ride on footpaths, bike paths, shared paths, and separated footpaths.
- If you are 13 years or older and you are accompanying a child 12 years or under, you can ride with them on a footpath.

Here at Tarneit Rise Primary School we are very proud of our school, our students, and our community. One of the reasons our school operates so well is because of our active and enthusiastic School Council. Each year we conduct elections for School Council. Parents and Department of Education (DoE) members are elected for a period of two years. Community members can also be co-opted to School Council for up to two years. This year there are three parent positions to be filled (2 years) and one DoE position.

We encourage people to seriously consider getting involved in School Council which meets once a month (every third Thursday from 6.00pm) and is an important decision-making body in the school. Any parent or carer of a student can be on School Council. School Councillors need to be prepared to work in a positive and constructive way with other parents to shape the future of our school, support our students and improve our school. No experience is necessary. Information and induction/training sessions are provided.

How do I nominate for the election?

If you decide to stand for election, collect a nomination form from the front office, or call so we can arrange to have one sent home with your child. Nominations open on Monday February 13th and close the following Monday February 20th. Complete all details and return the form to school. It is that easy! A ballot will only be held if the number of nominations exceeds the number of vacant positions. Please see us or any other councillor if you would like more information or have any questions about being on School Council. I Survived My First Week As A Prep
















Dear Prep Families and Carers,

We are so excited for a new school year to start and we have been so impressed with how well our prep children have entered school. It has been a fantastic week getting to know each other during transitions, interviews and our first day of school and we continue to look forward to building these relationships throughout the school year.

Learning to Learn

This week we began our learning to learn program to help our students further transition into school learning. During the learning to learn program, our prep children will be, familiarising themselves with our daily routine and weekly schedule and learning the classroom expectations. We will be learning about the five vowels of the alphabet, practising writing our names with correct capital and lower-case letter formations and counting to 5 and match numbers to collections.

Reading Satchel and Hat

Each week your child will get 3 books to read. Please record each night that you read in your child's TRPS Diary. Teachers will be checking this log every week when your child brings in their reading satchels. At TRPS we celebrate nights of reading, by awarding students certificates when they hit 25 nights increments. We aim for each student to have read 200 nights by the end of the year.

Sip and Crunch

In addition to your child's lunch box, we also ask that you bring a separate small container with chopped up fruit or vegetables. This is to be unpacked with their water bottle and placed on their table during morning admin time. We call this sip and crunch and provides children to have a little brain food whilst they are learning.

Labelling Uniforms and Hats

We also ask that your child brings their hat to school each day in their school bag. Students require Tarneit Rise school hats to play outside in both Term 1 and 4 of the school year. Please kindly ensure that all students' belongings and uniform is labelled with your child's name so that we may reduce students losing or misplacing their items throughout the year.


Unpacking and Packing bags

Students are expected to unpack and pack their own bags at school In the morning . Can you please ensure your child's bag is on their back and they are having a go at unpacking it themselves. Teachers are there to help them if need be but they will be having a go at unpacking it on their own. This will help build the child's independence.

Once again, we want to acknowledge how well your child has transitioned into school and we are very grateful for the work you have put in to ensure your child is independent and ready for school. We are so excited for our Prep 2023 students to have an amazing year full of learning, fun and making new friends.


Take Home Reading: This year we have returned to a Take Home Reading Journal. Please ensure that you record the reading your child has done each night into the journal and that they bring their Take Home Reading Bag and journal back on their borrowing day. If you have any questions about this, please talk to your child's classroom teacher. They will be more than happy to help you.

Sip and Crunch: Sip and Crunch is a great way for students to say focused on their learning. Please pack a small container of either fruit or vegetables that can be eaten easily during learning. For example, carrot sticks, grapes or cut up apples. This does not include fruits or vegetables that need to be peeled such as bananas or whole apples. Water should be provided to children in water bottles.


A few reminders:

- It is important that students are at school and on time everyday, so they are not missing out on valuable learning time.
- During Term 1 and Term 4, students must wear their hats when outside in the playground. Please make sure your child has a TRPS Bucket Hat, with their name clearly labelled.
- Students are encouraged to have a fruit break during the school day. Please bring along some cut up fruit or vegetables in a small container, separate to a lunchbox that can be placed on top of your child's desk.
- Please also ensure that your child brings a water bottle to school each day, filled with fresh water.
- We encourage healthy food for all our students so please don't send any chocolates, lollies, or drinks other than water in their lunchboxes. These are sometimes food that should be enjoyed at home.
- Lastly, students will start the process of bringing home books as part of the home reading program. We ask that your child brings their reading satchel to school on their designated day, so they can change their books. Please encourage or assist your child in recording how many nights they have read for so that they can receive their certificates to celebrate their reading milestones.

PLC 2





In Reading, the grade 3s have been looking at becoming familiar with their new classroom libraries and going through protocols whilst independently reading. They've established their reading interests and how to choose texts that are just right for them. Over the next couple of weeks, the students will be looking into world rivers and taking part in reading conferences with their classroom teachers.


In Writing, students have been shown how to organise their books so that they can produce their best writing pieces. They wrote a narrative based off a writing stimulus provided to them. We explored sentence types, how to draft sentences and the use of conjunctions to connect ideas. Over the next few weeks, the grade 3's will be exploring narrative writing structure and expanding simple sentences.

In Maths, grade 3's have been creating a birthday tally and graph and exploring the different types of warm up and recalls they will be seeing in maths lessons throughout the year. We have been exploring the mathematical growth mindset and setting positive attitudes towards learning and using problem solving strategies. In the coming weeks, we will be starting a unit on data and utilising different warm ups to engage students.


In Vocabulary, we have explored the importance of always expanding your vocabulary so that you can effectively explain your thoughts and feelings. The grade 3's were able to match words to pictures and symbols to help them understand words as well as finding synonyms and antonyms for these target words. We look forward to starting our vocabulary cycles this term and hope that all of our students can expand their own word collections.

Reminders:

- Ensure that your child is reading each night for at least 20 minutes and fill in the reading log.
- Please make sure that your child is at school each day unless they are unwell.
 Students need to bring their own stationery to school, please talk to your classroom teacher if you have any questions about this.
- In Term 1, students need to wear a hat outside.
 Over the next few weeks, students will be completing a research project about their culture and identity.
- Students will need to interview a family member or someone close to them to discuss how their culture has impacted the person they are today.



Welcome to PLC 4 for 2023! All of our students have settled in well during the first week at school and everyone has participated in our Learning to Learn program. This has involved various activities to get to know each other and to learn, review and practice the knowledge and skills required throughout the year. A major focus has been on the development of classroom protocols for all areas of learning. Students have shared what they think should be expected and these are the expectations they will follow.




READING

Students have been learning how to use our classroom libraries and the importance of selecting books that are 'just right' for them. When selecting these books students are thinking about how easy or challenging the text is and if it is interesting to them.



Vocabulary instruction is again a major focus for 2023 and students have revisited the importance of words and have participated in learning tasks that help to develop and expand their vocabulary. We are looking forward to continuing our language learning program throughout the year ahead.



We have introduced new Student Journals this year at TRPS. Reading is a cornerstone of learning and we expect that all students will spend some time reading independently at home. Students are encouraged to use their Student Journals to log their home reading on a daily basis and return these on their designated day to be checked by the classroom teacher. Students home reading nights are celebrated on accumulation of 25 nights.





WRITING

Students began writing by developing a set of protocols for independent writing and exploring problems and solutions we encounter during the writing process. Students have written letters to their teachers and were then given the opportunity to share some of their holiday adventures in written recounts. After reading all of the letters and recounts, the teachers are looking forward to teaching our unit on 'Imaginative Narratives' which will begin in week 6 of this term.



MATHS


Students began the term by creating a class birthday display presenting it as a picture graph. They discussed the data, answering questions such as 'which month has the most/least birthdays?'. This week students have also learnt new warm up games such as Place Value War and Greedy Pig. These games focus on Place Value and Number knowledge. Be sure to ask your students how to play these games.

Welcome Back

Welcome back to the school year of 2023! We hope that you had an amazing and relaxing holiday break. During the first two weeks of Year 5, the students have been participating in their Learn2Learn unit. The focus of this unit is to prepare the students for learning at TRPS. Please read on to learn about the specific topics covered during the first two weeks.

Learn2Learn

In Learn2Learn, the students have revisited the school values of respect, responsibility, kindness and growth. The students worked with their teacher and collaboratively with peers to discuss what these values look like, sound like and feel like. The students really enjoyed sharing and discussing their thoughts and how they would continue to show the school values at TRPS.

Reading

In Reading, the students began the term by discussing independent reading protocols, how we choose 'just right' books and how we track the books that we read. The students also discussed the differences between reading genres and how to manage the classroom library. The students also were able to discuss the importance of creating book recommendations and how these can help us choose a wider variety of books to read. Teachers have been conferring with students to discover their reading interests and to set some goals for the year.

Vocabulary

Over the past two weeks the students have been learning how to identify synonyms and antonyms for select vocabulary words and have discussed ways that their voice can be used and heard to share key ideas and thoughts.

Writing

In Writing, students discussed the importance of book work neatness and also wrote a letter to introduce themselves to their teachers. The students also discussed the importance of goal setting and expectations for conferring and brainstormed ways that would help them if they found writing difficult.


Mathematics

In Mathematics, the students started with gathering and collecting categorical data and then displaying that data as graphs in their workbooks. They then analysed themselves as mathematicians and identified their strengths, how they learn best and what areas they would like to work on. The students also discussed strategies they would use when thrown into 'the learning pit' and completed a pre-test for Place Value.

Reminders

- -Just a reminder that in Term 1, students need to be wearing a TRPS school hat during recess and lunchtimes.
- School diaries have now been sent home, it is an expectation that all students are reading regularly throughout the week and recording this in their diaries.



This is a process of: recording your thinking, making connections, predicting, identifying unknown vocabulary and summarising, which helps in building comprehension.




In Writing, we identified common problems that people have when creating written pieces and possible solutions. The children wrote a letter to their class teacher, which helps build the relationship with each student and used to identify areas for development over the coming term. We will continue learning new vocabulary each week, which we will share in our newsletter every 2 weeks.





In Maths, the children explored the development of a positive growth mindset. As a core school value, Growth is very important at TRPS. The children revisited the idea of entering into "The Learning Pit" and growing their understanding, by grappling with a problem and not giving up. Together, they created a list of strategies that they could use when they encounter something that they do not fully understand.



Student Journal: Every student has received a journal to record their nightly reading in. Please ensure that your child completes this and returns it to school on the day that their teacher has requested. It is a school expectation that the children read for at least 20 minutes every day.

Remember – Good Readers become Good Writers.

Arrange a meeting before or after school, but please be mindful that teachers have meetings Monday, Tuesday & Wednesday after school.



Kiddle - visual search engine for kids



Preps

Over the next 2 weeks our Prep students will be learning about the different areas of PE, the routines we have in PE and and introduction to the Fundamental Movement Skills in PE of Running, Athletic Skipping, Hopping, Jumping, SIde-steps and developing their spatial awareness when moving backwards. Routine is exceptionally important part of child development, once a child **knows** it is going to happen next and what to do when it does, they can begin to focus on the learning

Grade 1-2's

Our Grade 1 and 2 students will be completing a Fundamental Movement Skill assessment before moving onto a unit which will develop their locomotor skills. Our Grade 5 and 6 Students will also be completing a Fundamental Movement Skill Assessment where they will be given a movement goal for the semester to achieve. They will then begin a Unit of Net & Wall games starting with Badminton and Tennis.




